There may be tools in your collection toolbox of which you may not be aware that you may successfully use to help get Sometimes this information is not as available or obvious as paid. Some of these are rights found in the AIA - A-201 General Conditions, 2017 edition ("A-201"). Even though you Article 2.1.2 of the A-201, the owner is required to furnish this may not be offered the corresponding AIA A-401 subcontract agreement, the A-201 may be part of your contract documents pass this information onto you as a subcontractor. If so, be aware of these is suggested that you request that the general contractor obtain little known (and seldom used) rights, but to get the benefits, you have to ask for certain information and documents to which property and (2) the owner's interest in that property. Having vou are entitled. Don't hesitate.

It is recommended that each subcontractor consider exercising these rights, if they are available, earlier rather than later because it is much easier to receive cooperation in the early stages of a project while all parties are still enjoying the hot tub together, rather than later in the job after things go bad and you are standing 20 paces apart ready to aim. Here is a brief summary of rights that are available in the A-201 for the asking. If the job is bonded, it is beneficial to have a copy of the bond

Due Diligence on Owner

Preliminarily, you have the right to obtain information that will be helpful in doing your due diligence to evaluate financial risk. To help answer the question "Do I really want this job?" you should get as much information on the owner as reasonably possible, especially when the owner is unknown. Pursuant to Article 2.2.1 of the A-201, the owner is required, prior the commencement of the work, to furnish reasonable evidence that financial arrangements have been made to fulfil the owner's obligations under the contract. The furnishing of this information is a condition precedent to commencing work. It is, therefore, suggested that you request, even before a contract is signed, the name, address, telephone number, and email address of the principal contact person of the lender and a copy of all financial information supplied by the owner to the general contractor evidencing whatever financial arrangements the owner has made to fulfil its obligations. In the event the general contractor claims not to have any such information, you should ask the GC to obtain it.

If the general contractor is offering you a subcontract that makes payment by the owner to the general contractor a condition precedent to the general contractor's duty to pay you, then the general contractor should have no objection to obtaining and sharing this information.

Liens and Bonds

Next, under the lien law, you are required to give notice to the owner of your intent to enforce lien rights. Such notice includes the name of the owner and description of the property. first appears. There is relief when this happens. Pursuant to information to the general contractor who in turn is obligated to and furnish (1) a correct statement of the record legal title to the this information in advance saves time and money when the pressure is on to file a timely lien.

Likewise, Article 2.2.4 requires the owner to furnish surveys describing physical characteristics, legal limitations, and utility location and a legal description of the site. This information is invaluable to have during the job, especially for site contractors.

in advance rather than to wait until the end of the job when time restrictions may come into play. Article 11.1.3 requires a copy of any payment bond be furnished to a potential beneficiary. That obviously includes all subcontractors who are the primary beneficiaries of a general contractor's payment bond. Having a copy of the bond as early as possible is important because often times there are enforceable time limits for giving notice of you claim. Sub-subcontractors and suppliers are particularly at risk for having to give notice. Also, be aware suppliers at any tier by statute have bond rights on Missouri government projects, subject to giving a 90 day notice.

.....and More

The A-201 also entitles you to additional information not necessarily needed for filing a mechanic's lien or making a bond claim, but helpful for performing your work and assessing risk. Specifically, Article 3.10.1 requires the general contractor to prepare a construction schedule. In addition, Article 5.3 requires the general contractor make available to its subcontractors prior the execution of a subcontract, copies of the contract documents to which the sub is to be bound. The GC is required to identify the terms and conditions of the proposed subcontract agreement which may be at variance with the contract terms. This information, especially when obtained before the subcontract is signed, will be helpful in evaluating risks buried within the contract documents.

Finally, even if the A-201 document is not part of your contract documents, the rights afforded therein may serve as a good checklist of items to be included in your subcontract agreement.

For additional information about the Scholarship Fund contact Chris O'Hagan, J D Kutter <u>chris@jdkutter.com</u> Capitol staffers have been busy this month as legislative pre-filing has begun in preparation of the next legislative session which begins on January 8 at noon. Legislators began the bill prefiling process on December 1 with nearly 850 bills and resolutions having been filed as of the writing of this newsletter. Senate and House members will continue filing bills until midway through the session where nearly 2,000 bills are expected to be filed once the deadline for filing closes.

Several bills have already been filed that would raise the state fuel tax in order to fund road and bridge construction. In addition, there is a proposed constitutional amendment filed which would allow MoDOT to establish toll roads in the state. Another proposal would put a portion of increased motor vehicle registration fees into the state road fund. These initiatives have a tough road ahead of them and only time will tell whether they land on the governor's desk. Similar legislation has been met with stiff opposition from many conservative legislators in recent years and they have signaled their intent to block any proposed tax increases once again this session.

The Senate Interim Committee on Tax Credit Efficiency and Reform has held four hearings since late summer to examine the many tax credit programs in the state. Many view the tax credits as a necessary trigger for economic development, construction, and job creation, while others say the process is inefficient and lacks accountability. The committee was slated to wrap-up their review of the many programs in early December, but it was recently announced they will continue to hold hearings throughout the legislative session. Senator Cindy O'Laughlin, chairwoman of the committee, said she wants the committee to continue their work looking into how tax credits are processed and how their value is determined.

In other political news, a recent report by State Auditor Nicole Galloway has found that the Black Mountain Community Improvement District (CID) violated state law with their expenditure of \$296,937 of taxpayer money. The CID funds were intended to be spent on infrastructure, storm water controls and related construction. The audit showed several violations of state law, but the most glaring was an expense of more than \$100,000 for equipment purchases, repairs and operational expenses to a convenience store owned by three members of the CID board. Restrooms were remodeled, new fuel pumps were purchased, and a new walk-in beer cave was installed at the store. Six months after the work was completed, the convenience store was sold to new owners. The taxpayer dollars used for the work were not reimbursed. Current board members are working with law enforcement on the findings of the audit. The Black Mountain CID is near Van Buren, in Carter County, Missouri.

Repairs and renovations on the exterior of the state Capitol continue to progress with an anticipated completion date near the end of 2020. However, the refurbished statue of Ceres, the Roman goddess of agriculture, whose likeness sat atop the Capitol for 94 years is causing some controversy. The statue was removed last year and sent to Chicago for repairs and is now back in Jefferson City where it is slated to be placed on top of the dome once again. Representative Mike Moon didn't want to see Ceres returned to the dome due to religious reasons and has asked Governor Mike Parson to intervene. Moon sent a letter to the governor calling the statue a "pagan god" and wanted Parson to direct the Capitol Commission to not return the statue to the dome. Despite Rep. Moon's request Ceres was returned to the dome of the Capitol on December 17.

As mentioned earlier, the legislative session is slated to begin on Wednesday, January 8 and will run through May 15. Once the legislative session starts and legislation begins to move, weekly legislative updates will be sent to the ASA members updating you weekly on ASA's legislative priorities. CONTRACT REVIEW

In order to enhance your rights, use an appropriate "mutuality" clause. Include in your subcontract a clause saying that you have the same rights against the GC as the GC has against the owner. That way, if the GC has negotiated more favorable payment terms against the owner than you have against the GC, you may get the benefit of the more beneficial terms.

U.S. Department of Labor Issues Temporary Enforcement Policy for Certifications from Crane Institute Certification

WASHINGTON, DC – To avoid industry confusion and potential disruptions of construction crane projects, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has issued an enforcement policy for crane operator certifications issued by Crane Institute Certification (CIC). OSHA requires crane $\sqrt{}$ operators engaged in construction activity to be certified $\sqrt{}$ by an entity accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency. CIC no longer holds such $\sqrt{}$ accreditation.

The policy explains that, although CIC-issued certifications are not compliant with OSHA's operator certification requirement, OSHA does not intend to cite employers for operating equipment that violates that requirement if their operators, in good faith, obtained CIC -issued certifications prior to December 2, 2019, with the belief the certifications met the standard's requirements. Until further notice, OSHA will not accept CIC certifications – including re-certifications – issued on or after December 2, 2019.

Under the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, employers are responsible for providing safe and healthful workplaces for their employees. OSHA's role is to ensure these conditions for America's working men and women by setting and enforcing standards, and providing training, education and assistance. Hazard Recognition

Many workers are seriously injured each year by accidents. Accidents don't just happen. Accidents are the result of an error within control of one or more people. How do we recognize, assess and control hazards, which are potential accidents?

What is a Hazard?

A hazard is any practice, behavior, condition or combination that can cause injury or illness in people, or damage to property or the environment.

Health Hazards

- Chemical agents (solids, liquids or gases)
- Physical agents (energy or force such as sound, heat or electricity)
- Biological agents (microorganisms from plant, animal or human tissue)
- Ergonomic hazards (poor equipment, design or activity)

Safety Hazards

These can cause traumatic injury or death:

- Machinery and equipment related
- Energy (falls, struck by, kinetic, released)
- Confined space
- Material handling

What is Hazard Recognition?

Hazard Recognition means identifying a "suspected hazard", because of its potential to harm or damage, or having it brought to your attention. If you or someone else recognizes a potential hazard in the office or field, please complete and submit .

Tools to Assess a Hazard

When we receive the information related to a near miss, we should assess the hazard using the following tools:

- Detailed inspection or testing of the hazard
- Physical observation by trained individuals
- Investigations of near hit
- Interview of workers using Job Safety Analysis (JSA) Procedure
- Reviewing of records such as first-aid or safety meetings
- Compare findings to predetermined standards

Hazard Controls

The goal of hazard recognition and assessment is to eliminate the hazard or prevent it from harming workers or the environment. This can be completed using one of the following points of control.

- At the source preferred method of control. (engineering and/or management controls, isolation, elimination, etc)
- Along the path between the source and the worker (guard, enclosures, distance from hazard)
- At the worker control of last resort (PPE, training & scheduling)
